- (ii) agriculture promotion for food security
- (iii) child rights, specially platform children, child labour and girl child
- (iv) promotion of village volunteers (Gramdoots) for rural development
- (v) women empowerment through self help promotion and skill training
- (vi) networking with likeminded organisations and their capacity building
- (vii) strengthening of self governance
- (viii) establish linkages with government agencies for convergence of different schemes on welfare and livelihood

Activities carried out on above areas during the year 2019 – 2020 are presented in this report.

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## **Programme Progress Card**

### **A. LIVELIHOOD**

#### **A1) Promotion of Sustainable Tribal Livelihood in Central India**

Project duration – April 2016 – June 2019

No. of villages – 21

Families Covered – 2,850 tribal families, 350 OBC marginal farmers

Supporting Agency – SwissAid India

Coverage – Amarpur and Bajag blocks – 10 and 11 villages respectively.

Objectives:

- Provide sustainable livelihood round the year by adopting sustainable agricultural practices in 3200 families

Achievements :

- 248 families adopted use of local seeds and ecological agricultural practices
- 30 families adopted improved agricultural practices viz. line sowing, etc.
- 296 families prepared natural pesticides and used in their farms
- 56 families did soil and water conservation measures in 16 acres of their farms
- 409 families started kitchen garden using local vegetable seeds. Availability of vegetables increased from 3 months to 7 months.
- 14 villages initiated forest management practices under CFR covering 9300 Ha. This process continued in project area through forestry study group.
- 22 types of indigenous seeds and species collected in 14 villages of Baiga Chek area.
- 156 families conserved and increased plantation of 6 different types of edible roots and tubers. These practices are continuing in the project area.
- 60 women farmers trained as Master Trainer started providing training on ecological agriculture in project villages.
- Plantation of bamboo and Koailar done in project area.
- 40 families started using water from Hydram for irrigation and vegetable farming.

Impact –

- Food security is achieved round the year for tribal communities in the project area.
- Low cost agriculture practices are adopted by families in the project area.
- Regeneration of indigenous species of plants and seeds is achieved

Long term partnership of NIWCYD with SwissAid started in the year 2008. During these years different projects were executed in tribal area of Dindori and Mandla districts of Madhya Pradesh. This project concluded in June 2019.

## **A2) Vegetable Initiative Programme in Vidarbha, Maharashtra (SFAC)**

Year of Starting : Jan. 2013

Supporting Agency : SFAC, New Delhi

Location of Project: Clusters in Nagpur, Chandrapur, Bhandara, Gondia and Gadchiroli districts, Maharashtra.

Objectives :

- Strengthening of farmers interest groups for vegetable production
- Promotion of Farmer Producer Organization (FPO) and Collective Marketing

Achievements :

- Six weekly Kissan Makets started in Nagpur with collaboration of Maharashtra State Agriculture Marketing Board through Nagpur FPO. NIWCYD is managing this activity.
- In Gondia district FPOs started organic vegetable and rice cultivation and established Krushi Sewa Kendra.
- FPOs in Bhandara district are working in coordination with Nagpur FPO and supplying vegetables for weekly markets in Nagpur.

The project completed in 2015-16, however, NIWCYD is providing handholding support to the FPOs for smooth functioning and operations.

- The objective of the proposed program is to increase the agriculture productivity of the various crops in the region.
- The direct impact of improved agriculture productivity would be the increased food security for the households who currently report household food availability between 3-9 months in the year.
- To facilities the empowerment of farmer /producers though assistance for Mobilization, Organization in to association .cooperatives etc. for their increased participation in planning, marketing technology dissemination and agro processing etc.

Impact :

- Farmer started seed treatment in proper manner.
- Most of the farmer started line sowing in farming method.
- Marginal farmers linked with FPOs for marketing of their farm produce.
- Turnover of each FPO is between Rs. 50 Lakhs to 100 Lakhs.
- Production has increased by 30 % due to improved agriculture practices.
- The Board of Directors are managing their activity and management of FPOs independently with technical support of NIWCYD.

#### **A4) Livelihood promotion of Marginal farmers in suicide prone areas of Gatanji taluka of Yavatmal district, Maharashtra**

Date of Starting : April 2015 – March 2020

Supported by : Forbes Marshal Foundation, Pune & Help for Children in Need, Pune

Goal : Contributing towards ecological balance and enabling community members to adapt measures of climate change mitigation and reduce its adverse impact on the livelihood of communities.

Objectives:

- To improve the ground water level through adopting traditional rainwater harvesting systems and water conservation measures.
- To bring changes in the conventional synthetic fertilizer and pesticide intensive agriculture pattern and gradually replace it with less external resource depended eco friendly sustainable farming.
- Strengthening of community based institutions through enhancing their knowledge, and skills to better manage the water resources and ecologically sensitive practices.
- Awareness creation among schoolchildren and youths on climate change and its adverse affect on ecology; explore and demonstrate various mitigation measures.
- Promotion of indigenous crop varieties and incorporate such items and practice mixed crop that require less water and external inputs.

Major achievement :

- The community based organizations in the village Nimbarda has been actively taking up the management and maintenance of rainwater harvesting structure and community well recharged as the result of the increased groundwater level through collective actions and follow up.
- Community members are active in village panchayat meeting and frequent discussion with PRI representatives on starting up works in the villages related to rainwater harvesting and improving the soil fertility through effectively utilizing bio - mass.

- The practice of group farming and support of ecological farming through self help group collectives started in village Anji is now replicated in other villages both project and non project areas.
- 200 families have successfully practicing backyard vegetable cultivation through adopting ecological methods and attained 6 – 7 month access to fresh organic green vegetable and attained self reliance in indigenous seeds and planting materials.
- With 40 new families started vermi- compost making in the current year, the total farmers in the project villages those who are successfully making vermi- compost has rose to 80.
- Children’s ecological learning groups are actively engaging in their weekly activities like reading, storytelling, and nature walk and caring of vermi- compost pits in their house premises, caring backyard vegetable garden.
- Women self help group members have more access to internal lending and 80% of the members adopted ecological farming practices to grow vegetable in their backyard to meet their household requirements of vegetable and have more access to internal lending and 80% of the members adopted ecological farming practices to grow vegetable in their backyard to meet their household requirements of vegetable.
- Women household members are active to keep hygiene surrounding to water bodies, and voluntarily care and protect trees planted neat the water bodies.

When we had seen Leelabai Bhagat, an Anganwadi worker living alone in village Tiwsala, she



was keen to talk about cutting a big tamarind tree in front of her house for extending construction of house to the area where the tree was standing. Right from that moment, our talk about the importance of a tree in a house premises and its positive impact on the environment, health of soil and ground water has started as a discussion point. Even though she was not well interested in that discussion in the beginning, she realised the some facts

we had pointed out in front of her. The first thing was the beautiful sprawling canopy of the plant, next the number of birds, butterflies and small animals like squirrels living on that plant and the importance of those life. Finally she admitted the truth by saying “yes, in the morning the birds and squirrels used to woke me up with their pretty sounds and look. Her doubt and misunderstanding on the dried leaves piled around the canopy also have rectified by suggesting her to accumulate the leaves in a small pit and convert them into good soil inputs for her flowering plants.





We have invited Leelabai in all our training and exposure trips to orient her about ecological farming for better nutritional safety and clean environment. Her doubts on how a woman having no land expect a small house and backyard can become a farmer also have cleared from her mind after having interaction with various women members in villages where they have successful story of their efforts in kitchen gardening with no external input.

Without looking back, Leelabai started her efforts in her small premises with vermi- composting by using bio-degradable substances like dried leaves of her tamarind tree and kitchen waste, we suggested her to keep all her flowering plant grow together the vegetable that we have introduced to her. In the first year itself she got 3 months access to 5 different varieties of vegetable for her use and conserved seeds of those vegetable for the next year for her own use and given back to us for distributing among other households. Meanwhile, we suggested her to call the children around in her home to see her effort, for their sitting arrangement we had made a platform around the tamarind tree. The children used to visit Leelabai's house with their toys, books paper and colour pencils to read write dance sing and draw.

The project is completed in March 2020.

#### **A8) Securing critical areas of Kanha – Achanakmar Corridor Through Community Led Conservation Initiatives.**

Date of Starting : Jan. 2019

Supporting Agency : World Wild Fund for Nature India (WWF India)

Location of Project : Dindori, MP

Coverage : No. of Villages – 10

Objective of the Program:

Empower community to conserve and manage community forest rights areas and secure their livelihood through convergence and effective management of their Community Forest/ Community Forest Rights areas, thereby also helping in maintaining functionality of Kanha Achanakmar Corridor. Thus the core areas of interventions are:

1. Mapping and validating the Community Forest Rights titles in 10 selected villages of Samnapur and Bajag blocks of Dindori district.
2. Building the monitoring and management capacities of the selected youths from 10 villages to undertake ecological monitoring for sustainable management of Community Forest Rights areas.
3. Developing Conservation and Management Plan for community forest resources for each village and formalize agreement between different villages with an aim to sustainably manage and use their community forest rights areas.

#### **Activities Implemented in the Project Area:**

The project was sanctioned for a period from January to December 2019. The no Cost extension to the project was given by WWF India on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2020 for a period of 6 months up to June 2020. During the period from January 2019 to June 2020, NIWCYD implemented the following activities in the 10 project villages:

1. Capacity Building/ Training for youth
2. Data Collection and collection of the socio-economic status of the local community.
3. Community Consultations & meetings to agree on initiating the process of claiming forest rights.
4. Preparation of maps showing resource use area, natural features water bodies critical wildlife areas habitation areas etc across the 10 villages.
5. Initiation workshop with district administration of Dindori introducing the proposed project & soliciting support.
6. Workshop with members of the District level coordination Committee to present the claims by the 10 villages/settlements.

The key interventions carried out during the year 2019-20 are as under:

- 1) 300+ villages' data on area sown under ragi & jowar in 2017-18 and 2018-19 was collected & compiled from data available with 5 Taluqua Agri. Officers.
- 2) 50 opinion leaders were identified in 5 clusters to take lead in FIGs formation & help the PCS in completing the group formation process & make the farmers aware of the benefits of FIGS formation & in turn registration of 5 FPCs.
- 3) All the 50 opinion leaders formed minimum 250 FIGS by each leader in their respective villages under the guidance of 5 Project Coordinators.
- 4) Out of Five FPCs one FPC at Turkewadi was registered on 2nd march 2020.

- 5) The first AGM of Turkewadi FPC was held on 9<sup>th</sup> March 2020 to give approval to the Board of Directors of FPC.

**A10) Bring Improvement in the livelihood resources and improve access to better sanitation and enhanced income sources with dignity for rural women**

Supported by : Thyssenkrupp Industries, Pune (Maharashtra)

Goal : Women members of the self help groups in the villages able to undertake group activities for enhancing their livelihood related income through utilizing their own skills and organized efforts.

Objectives:

- Identification of present lacunas in the skill base among self help group members.
- Provide adequate inputs for improving their skills together with strengthen their entrepreneurship capacity.
- Establish better coordination in between various stakeholders like (bodies of local self governance and various government agencies, private firms) to provide better atmosphere for entrepreneurship promotion among women self help group members.
- Provide adequate skills and knowledge on quality control, marketing requirement and marketing their products.
- Community based institutions will take leading roles to keep the hygienic atmosphere around the village, significantly protecting common wells and water bodies from contamination, ground water safety, building and maintenance of toilets, solid waste management through community participation.

- Models of bio composting based on bio degradable waste materials are demonstrated in the village in the premises of marginal farmers and sensitized the villagers on the various benefits of bio –composts and its wider positive environmental impacts.

Conducted base line survey in two poorest villages in the nearby area where the activities conducted in the present project village Takwe (b) has all potential to replicate in forthcoming days.

**Detail of Case: -** The child's mother called and asked us to help her in getting certificates of her husband from her husband in order to get cast certificate of the child.

**Assistant provided:** On 04/12/2019, we called the child's mother and asked her to come to the Childline office. She came to the Childline office on the same day and we talked to her. She told us that she had divorced her husband when her daughter was 3 months old and her daughter was now 9 years old.

She added that she had to take care of her daughter and now her daughter needed the cast certificate for educational purpose for that she needed the certificates of her father. In order to get the certificates of her husband she went to her husband's place and asked him to give her the certificates. He then refused to give her the certificates. On the same day child's mother and the child were presented before the CWC. The CWC told her that they would send a letter to the child's father.

- On 07/12/2019, a letter from the CWC was handed over to the child's father and we asked him to come to the CWC.
- On 10/12/2019, child's father came to the CWC. He told them that he would bring the documents to them.
- On 17/12/2019, the child's father came to the CWC with the documents.
- On 18/12/2019, we submitted the documents to the child's mother and asked her to get the cast certificate.

- Political empowerment of women members of the institutions for effective utilization of formal platforms for decision making while ensuring gender equality and dignity especially, decentralized body of governance.

- More than 200 self help groups are actively involved in various income generating activities, individually and 80 group level entrepreneurship development initiatives in Wardha, Yeotmal and Nagpur districts as the result of their increased access of credits from various formal financial institutions.
- Apart from entrepreneurship development activities, group members are involved in various interventions like organic agriculture, rainwater harvesting, and kitchen garden activities as the result of orientation and refresher trainings on “climate change and its mitigation measures at grassroots level”.
- Women members of Tejaswini self help groups in district (Wardha and Yeotmal) which are severely hit by persistent drought and water crisis have been active participants in a mission having specific objective of water conservation and increasing ground water level.
- Federation (CMRCs) in Wardha and Nagpur have been joint hands for scaling up their existing marketing of vegetable and value added products at Nagpur urban areas under the banner of “*from farmer’s field to urban markets*”.
- SHGs of Nagpur district had updated their data in the software developed and introduced by NABARD.
- The credit access and repayment status have improved in district, Nagpur, Wardha, Yeotmal and Bhandara where CMRCs had entered into an agreement with ICICI bank. This is a positive change in the management of micro finance effectively by SHGs independently.

**Major Outcomes / Achievements :**

- i. At Rajapurwadi, being a remote located village, rescue and food supply from other sources was delayed. Unfortunately the whole village was very badly affected by heavy flood and people were eagerly waiting for instant relief and food. When NIWCYD team reached along with the food bags. The villagers expressed their happiness and felt that helping hands are around them to make their life good again. And they got confidence and belief that they can stand again and lead their life. Although it was a temporary support but they were thankful to CAF India Foundation to help them to survive. This relief supported a lot to those affected people of the village, they could engrossed their self in resettling their houses and other work.
- ii. Natural calamities and disasters are unpredictable. But affected people urgently need relief aid and support for their survival, hunger, shelter, and clothing. The condition of Rajapurwadi village block Shirole District Kolhapur was pathetic. When it came to know that Rajapurwadi village needs urgent help,. After getting the funding support for food grains from CAF India it added strength to NIWCYD. And accordingly NIWCYD team started working on it. After getting the confirmation and fund support NIWCYD completed the task in a very short period. Without any losses and damages food items were reached to flood affected people of Rajapurwadi and distribution of food bags (In first Phase 220 families received food bags of 38 Kg. and in second Phase 49 families received food bags of 26 KG) was done smoothly to the 269 marginalized families of Rajapurwadi village in time. It was a great team

work of volunteers of NIWCYD. This work of NIWCYD and Donar agency CAF India are well appreciated by the local people of Rajapurwadi and government officials of NABARD, Local Police, Sarpanch etc.

- iii. The disaster of flood was spread to a very big region of whole Kolhapur Districts. Many organizations were providing the help in many ways. But all efforts were inadequate in front of the volume of destruction. Rajapurwadi village in Shirole block is located at remote interior place, so relief aid could not reach their, the villagers were feeling that they are unattended. Thus residents and local authority were worrying. When NIWCYD team reached with food bags, the happiness on their faces was obvious and they got confidence that some support system is standing for them. And constantly they were expressing their gratitude for the support. This relief supported a lot to those affected people of the village, they could engrossed their self in resettling their houses and other work. Photographs are enclosed, showing happiness on villagers' faces after getting support of food grains and grocery.
- iv. Press media took the note of support of CAF India and NIWCYD. Some news papers published the news of the support given by CAF India and NIWCYD. Scanned copies of news in Daily Sakal in regional language

## CASE STUDIES

**Calamities Collapsed from the Sky :** Kolhapur District of Maharashtra faced an ill fate in rainy season of 2019. Most of the villages were submerged. Lakhs of people were forced to take shelter in rescue centers. The Crops, The Cattle and the livelihood all drained. Among many villages, Rajapurwadi is one of the worst affected village during the flood. Rajapurwadi is located at the southern part of Shirol Block of Kolhapur District (Maharashtra) . The village is situated on the banks of Krishna River. All approach roads were blocked. Rajapurwadi was converted as an island surrounded by flood water. This natural calamity took away the livings of residents of Rajapurwadi . Most of the houses were submerged and damaged severely. Among 2200 affected people only 53 could stay in the village rest all were shifted to safe rescue camps. All relief which was sent by either Government Machineries or other organizations was falling short . NIWCYD & CAF India identified the real trouble of shortage of food and took instant actions to help the flood affected people.

**60 years Shushila Billure** is an aged farm worker of Lingayat Community and a resident of Rajapurwadi. An orphan widow with no survivors after her, is passing her life by earning daily wages. Her house is situated at the banks of Krishna River. Rainy season of 2019 , destroyed her living base. The 15 days flood in August 2019 drained out everything from this village. Shushila Billure's house was submerged in 11 feet water and it is heavily damaged . The Food Packet supplied by NIWCYD Volunteers



supported by CAF India reached her when there was just meager food remained to survive. She expressed her happiness and thanked to NIWCYD and CAF India for helping her to survive and providing the food which was enough for her for next 30-35 days and it is also helped for resettlement of her day to day routine needs.

**Mr. Rajgonda Patil** a well to do farmer having 5 acres land. He is known for his helping nature. All 5 members of his family were happy and were living a contented life. August 2019 flood drained out all his living, all crop damaged, the farm machineries/ equipments , home appliances, stored grains, cattle .. all washed away.. A person who was known for his helping stories to others now compelled to ask for help to others... But, all were helpless. The survival of 5 people was a big problem. Timely supply of Food packets by NIWCYD came to him as blessing of the God and which helped his family to meet the hunger for 10-15 days.... All family is thankful to NIWCYD and CAF India .

**Mr. Kamal Patil** has a family of 4 members . Earning members are farm labours. In the flood, all farms were submerged. So their daily earning got stuck. The home was completely underwater and practically nothing left out . No shelter, No Food the situation was very pathetic. Feeding to the hunger of family was a crucial problem for Mr. Kamal. Food packet by NIWCYD and CAF India helped the family in such crucial time. Mr. Kamal could feed his family for 10 to 15 days and it is also helped for resettlement for starting their routine work.

NIWCYD and CAF India has supported such types of 269 very poor families of Rajapurwadi Village of Shirol Taluka, Dist. Kolhapur (Maharashtra) in month of September 2019.
