# **ABOUT NIWCYD**

National Institute for Women Children & Youth Development (NIWCYD) is a non-governmental voluntary organization (NGO) that was formed in 1982 by a group of young social workers in Nagpur.

### The primary objectives of the Organization:

- 1. Working for the overall development of women, children, and youth and empowering them for the purpose of obtaining their participation in the process of their own development
- 2. Developing skills and leadership potential of rural and tribal youth
- 3. Improving self-sufficiency of people living in remote areas of the country by their social and political empowerment through Panchayat Raj Institutions and local CBOs without drastically altering their lifestyles and
- 4. Undertaking activities related to Natural Resource Management including soil and water development and conservation.

NIWCYD works in an integrated and holistic approach where the various thematic areas converge to push and unfold the development story of the tribal and marginalized communities. Main Thematic areas of the NIWCYD

- (1) Tribal & Forest,
- (2) Livelihood Sustainable Agriculture & Market Place
- (3) Child Rights
- (4) Climate Change
- (5) Water, Women empowerment, Youth development in cross program

Our policy in addressing social issues is not only restricted to the field but we also adopt in our life or office culture, what we teach to the partners (beneficiaries). Community mobilization is our strength and creating a friendly atmosphere for the team is our culture.

During 2023-24, thought processes have been generated towards the overall development of the organization, joint efforts have been taken to improve domains that contribute to organizational development i.e. Strategy plan, internal and external communication, policy amendments as per updated scenario, technology, etc.

As tribal development, livelihood, climate change, WASH and sanitation, Child rights and education are always a main theme for the NIWCYD, during 2023-24 we have taken initiatives for conservation millets, schools WASH improvement, strengthening child and youth volunteers groups and sustainable tribal livelihood.

Non-chemical farming, low-cost farming, strengthening the FPOs, natural resources management, women empowerment, skill-based training for the youth, WASH, and child safety were the focus areas.

# Introduction

During 2022-23 focus of NIWCYD was on strengthening FPOs and good Sanitation practices in the community, support to enhance skills of SHG members, and awareness about child safety. Apart from this major focus was on organizational development by assessing the performance indicators of various domains.

NIWCYD has reached up to 187318 beneficiaries of 2385 villages from Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Chattisgarh, Uttar Pradesh etc. These beneficiaries have been covered through direct and indirect support like training, financial support, input distribution, etc.

The annual report consists of thematic plans and achievements during the year, case studies, photographs, and team composition.

The year 2023-24 is much into the development of organizations by improving the associated indicators and these indicators are Strategy planning, communication, adoption of technology, leadership and training, M&E system, and standardization of documentation, etc.

Developed a strategy plan for 2024 to 2033, and decided core thematic areas that NIWCYD will focus on coming 7 years.

66 FPOs have been strengthened and supported for documentation, procurement, marketing, etc. This leads to FPO linked to ONDC Mystore, Bech App, and eNam for commodity marketing.

869 SHGs have been supported for skill enhancement, livelihood opportunities, bank linkage, branding – packaging, and marketing. Which outcome SHGs have sold the product in exhibitions, and other market.

WASH activities have been implemented in 82 villages and this impacted the 16 villages are conducting water testing/managing drainage water, villagers themselves taking ownership for maintaining the WASH module.

We have reached out to 6981 children and supported for education, counseling, skill enhancement, health, sanitation, etc.

198 tribal villages have been covered for the conservation of millet, forest conservation, livelihood, education, youth development, etc.

We have trained, motivated, and supported 6981 youth for education, vocational training, livelihood, etc.

During 2023-24, we have conducted/participated in37 workshops conducted at various levels (district level/state level/national level/international level).

Successful collaboration is done with 21 partner organizations either for research, implementation, etc.

NIWCYD team members vary in a wide range of characteristics such as experience and knowledge. At present 129 members are associated with the NIWCYD, of which 31 members contribute as leadership board members, 13 members as management team members, and 22 are permanent staff and the rest of the team members are associated on a project basis and contribute as ground-level team members.





# Focused during 2023-24

- 1) Organization Development through modification of policies, strengthening HR management system, and data management system, adapting the technology, and capacity building of multiple level team members.
- 2) We have updated HR policies and financial policies, gender polcy, child protection policy with additional clauses to reflect a great workplace and culture.
- 3) Ensure child safety through an awareness program, leveraging with line department and other stakeholders
- 4) Tribal development by conserving deciduous commodities and culture
- 5) Livelihood enhancement of the community by supporting agriculture, small entrepreneurship, FPOs, SHGs, etc.
- 6) Value addition and marketing of farm produce and millet, establishing online and offline market linkages
- 7) Improving WASH and sanitation of the community by supporting Schools, villagers, community, etc.
- 8) Sustainability of supported program by establishing/strengthening community leaders, groups, etc.
- 9) Reporting structure: NIWCYD has established an MIS system that coverers the progress of all the ongoing projects. Additionally, the project shares the MIS to the funder/donor as per the given and agreed frequency. Frequency: Each project team shares monthly reports in the pre-defined template to the M&E section of the organization.

# **Overall Coverage**

During 2023-24 (April to March 2024), NIWCYD reached out to 187318 people and 46845 families in 2385 villages in 58 districts of 4 states through 22 budgeted and 8 non-budgeted programs.

A process has been conducted to initiate and assess the indicator's progress that includes capacity building of 1<sup>st</sup> line, 2<sup>nd</sup> line, and ground level team, comparing baseline status and current status, planning, team

allocation, etc.

• A chain of 5 workshops has been conducted for NIWCYD's family members and invited 7 external(Annexure) experts from April 2023 to September 2023.

• Every workshop has focused on building a roadmap to make progress in a domain that is critical as per the baseline report. Conducted consultation workshop to



brainstorm ideas and create a rough plan that will help to make an organizational strategy. An external consultant has been invited for the thematic guidance, strategic process, and preparation of the plan. The workshop sessions were conducted in a participatory approach where all participants were actively involved in the discussion.

• A thorough discussion has been held on the assessment report shared by GROW, earlier history, status as per grow report, current status, and further planning have been discussed for each indicator of OD process. Along with this SWOT analysis for the organization has been conducted using the focused group discussion method.

• Problem tree analysis has been discussed with an example of a child rights theme. This activity also has been conducted using the focused group discussion method.

• Theme-wise challenges and solutions have been discussed in the meeting. In the second half, the thought process of objectives and goals of each theme has been generated in a participatory approach.

• Each workshop and meeting has given us the insight to improve the domain's performance where we were lagging.

### **Organization Development:**

• **Strategic Plan:-** We have developed a strategic plan for the coming 7 years – 2024 to 2033, in consultation with the external resource person Mr. Chandrkant Shetkar.

• **Technology Adoption:** During this year we have adopted some applications for day-to-day task completion. The tools we have adopted for content development, data visualization, data storage, etc.

• **Policies:** NIWCYD has reviewed and updated mandatory policies i.e. HR policy, finance policy, gender policy, child safety policy, etc.

• **Visibility:** Internal and external communication policy as well as implementation has been started, and we have initiated to increase visibility on social media platforms, website, etc.

Under livelihood, NIWCYD is running 14 projects namely USHA Silai Machine, HRDP, Natural farming, and SFAC, LBCC, BIJ, SHG program, FPO program, Wel-Netrutva.

**USHA Silai Machine:** The Usha Silai machine program was initiated during 2011-12 with the support of USHA International, It is a long-term program whose goal is "**To Make Women Self Reliant and Empowered and Connect them with Employment**", and the objectives of the project are as below.

### **Objectives:**

• To identify and train the rural women to build their capacities around stitching & and machine repairing.

• To support and facilitate the Silai school for the extension of its activities at the village level.

• To discuss and orient the Silai school facilitator on women empowerment issues.

In the initial phase of 2011-12, the project started with 150 beneficiaries and gradually it increased to **2187** beneficiaries by 2023-24. The project is being implemented in Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh state in 2023- 24 project has reached out to the **2187** women to support the livelihood business of stitching units.

- In Chhattisgarh **3893** women have been provided training and **1466** women have started businesses.
- In Madhya Pradesh **2107** women have been provided training and **721** women

have started businesses.





### Key Activities during 2023-24:

1) Overall 11 trainings have been conducted for 381 women on MIS management,

2) At present there are 31 classical and 206 satellite schools running in Chhattisgarh and Madhya Pradesh area.

3) No. of schools 15 classical, satellite 25 schools (2<sup>nd</sup> phase).

4) SIDBI has conducted 30 Satellite School Training which covered 175 silai schools throughout the year.

5) USHA International Limited has conducted 15 classical School Training have been complete which covered 30 silai schools throughout the year.

6) 22 Silali Schools have completed the Learner certificate in the year.

### Outcome:

- 1) 103 Women have established a business of Silai Machine
- 2) 10 Women (teachers) have been promoted as a master trainer

Poject name "Earning with Dignity, Women Empowerment through Strengthening of SHGs, Social wellness through CLCs and WASH Initiatives at NMC operated Schools & Shanti Nagar Slum community, Nagpur" is being supported by the HCL foundation

The project focuses on enhancing the skills of women and supporting them in livelihood activities. Along with this providing vocational training to the youth and motivating them for aspiration and supporting livelihood activities. • During 2023-24, the females enrolled in **Assistant to Nurse** training are 40.

• A six-monthly **Tally** course has been initiated for youth and under the same, 25 female youth have been enrolled. NIWCYD has engaged an external resource person to provide training to the women.

• Capacity building and Entrepreneurship support have been provided to 6 males and 337 women.

- One capacity-building training program on PoP of Millets cultivation has been provided to the farmers through the support of KVK, Gariaband. 200 farmers reached out in quarter 1 (Goal 1.1).

- Six units of women-led community enterprises promoted (Goal 1.2)

- 166.63 acres of unirrigated land converted into vegetative cover. (Goal 4)

- Mr. Ranjan Sharma, CSR Regional Manager, visited at project location of Gariaband, Chattishgarh on 27<sup>th</sup> May 2023. A healthier interaction has made up with VDC, PRI and community representatives & deliberated the best sustainability approaches for the future through resource management focusing the importance of millets, bamboo craft, women enterprises, seed bank and other enterprises. Direct interaction with VDC, Community / beneficiaries, entrepreneurs, and groups has been done. Key challenges of the region have been presented. Visited at FPC office cum outlet and observed the value-added products of millets & organic manure/ liquids.

### Key achievement of the project:

The project has covered 500 households in 5 blocks of 2 districts i.e. Dindhori and Balaghat by helping them in community mobilization, low-cost farming, processing, and marketing of farm produced.

- Conducted 75 sessions with farmers as per the Package of Practices (PoP) of (Natural Farming (NF) including land preparation and planning aiming for crop biodiversity, Seed Treatment, Nutrient Management, Pest and Disease Management, etc. Nearly 30 FIGs were identified and each FIG trained 6 times in a cropping season
- Encouraging farmers to invest in producing 20 structures on their land for Nutrient Management and other PoPs. The structures include Bio mulching, Miyabaki plantation etc.

### Safe City Initiatives

Project started in 2018

**Location: Bhopal** 

#### Safe City Initiatives:

Project named "Empowering Adolescents and Youth – Safe City Program" Safe City initiatives were initiated in 2018 in Bhopal city of MP with the support of Muskan (UNICEF) with the goal of "Spread Awareness regarding Child and Woman safety amongst the general population." The



project has covered (1) 2500 youth & adolescents, (2) 2909 FLWs and stakeholders (3) community members – 6981 in 24 wards of 10 zones in Bhopal city.

# Objectives of the project are as below:

• Alternative Care, Family strengthening, and preventive and rehabilitative services

• Adolescent Empowerment and youth Participation towards Ending Child Marriage. During 2023-24 NIWCYD has reached out to 5095 individuals for counseling, education support, health support, etc.

# Key activities of the project for 2023-24:

 53 coordination meetings were organized with counselors, sector supervisors, police officers, health in-charge and zone officers, health center in-charge, and CDPO-WCD. Through these meetings 235 participants of which 73 were male and 162 were female participants.

- Capacity building training was conducted with different FLWs, in which discussion was held for improving mental health in children. 532 participants have been covered through the training of which 80 were male and 452 were female.
- Conducted various awareness programs on hotspots identified under Safe City programs at 5 communities in which 220 individuals were counseled for awareness on hot spots. Women, men, teenagers, and children were awarded through talks at different places for awareness of hot spots.
- Need assessment exercise has been conducted with 53 stakeholders to identify the • alternative care and social protection schemes.
- 50 street children have been identified and form a group of these children. After counselling and motivation through regular visits and meetings, total 34 children of 53 children have been enrolled in the schools.
- Capacity building of 33 community counsellors and core groups have been done by regular trainings, sessions, and meetings. These 33 community counselors conduct the MHPSS sessions at filed level.
- 25 Child Protection Committees have been formed in which 327 members are involved. These committees have facilitated the dialogs between NSS, Police team and community members.
- Sensitization on gender equality and POSH committees and its functioning in 50 schools
- 25 women those are victims of domestic violence have been linked with safety committee at various levels.
- Conducted 35 awareness program in the hotspot for various issues like conducted 8 sector level meetings with CDPO, CWPO, and Urja desk in-charge in which 341 participants have been participated.
- Conducted 6 awareness activities like nukkad/natak/film show/puppet show/Quiz/SGBV • dance etc.). Celebrated MHM day and conducted 4 events, celebrated 1 child Labor Day, 1 WYSD day in which 343 community members have participated.
- 2 E-KYC camps were organized with support of BMC
- 753 vulnerable families have been linked with social protection schemes. Out of 753 families 718 have been linked with Ladli Behna Yojna and 35 families have been linked with other schemes.
- Conducted 3 trainings of youth federation regarding structure, roles and responsibilities etc. •
- Conducted 3 Youth led Election Manifesto campaigns. Innovations:

Location: Pendra, Chhattisgarh

A new project was initiated in August 2023 in partnership with Mahatma Gandhi Rural Industrial Park Chattisgarh. The project will cover children and women by supporting them in skill



enhancement as per the needs and interests of the youth and women stakeholders, supporting them in micro/medium enterprises, establishing market linkage, and assuring forward and backward linkage.

Till September 2023, NIWCYD has reached out to 86 beneficiaries of 2 blocks for preparing plates, and bowls from natural resources, to establish the KIOSK center, Fish unit etc.

### Sustainable Operation and Maintenance of 17 piped water supply schemes

### Project Started in 2022

### Location- Hardoi Uttar Pradesh

The project has been supported by the HCL Foundation and is being implemented in 12 villages of 3 blocks of Hardoi district of Uttar Pradesh with the main objective of establishing a sustainable model for the operation and maintenance of water supply schemes.

Project Period- December 2022 to November 2023

### **Objectives:**

**Water Supply Sustainability:** The central goal of the SAMUDAY program is to establish a sustainable model for the operation and maintenance of water supply schemes. This includes

providing Functional Household Tap Connections (FHTCs) to ensure that all households within water supply areas receive clean and safe drinking water consistently.

**Community Engagement:** SAMUDAY recognizes that the success of any



development project hinges on community participation. It aims to involve all villagers in the operation and maintenance of their invillage water supply systems.

### Information, Education, and Communication (IEC):

The program heavily relies on an IEC approach to educate and inform villagers about the importance of water conservation, safe water handling, tariff collection, and the operation and maintenance process.

# Key activities of the project for 2023-24:

a. Conducted 5 trainings on Operation and maintenance, FTK, Tarrif collection, etc.

- b. Out of the targeted 4 all 4 community engagement activities have been conducted for IEC designing, BCC, FGDs, meetings, Celebration of important Days, and Handover events.
- c. A total of 428 operation and maintenance services have been provided to the villagers in 12 villages.
- d. Engage the community through meetings, empower local institutions like SHGs and VWSCs, and ensure consistent operation and maintenance of the water system for sustainability.

### Major Outcome

1. HH level water tap connection has been improved from 53% to 94%, out of 1174 families 1108 families have been benefitted for HH level water tap connection. Which leads to improved access to safe and adequate water to the families.

2. Pre-intervention 37 families used to pay Tarrif and post-intervention 819 families regularly contributed to Tariff collection

3. Well-trained pump operators are now operating village-level water systems successfully

**Location Nagpur MH** 

**WASH:** the project is being supported by the HCL Foundation.

Women + Water

Project Started in 2019



Location: Maharashtra

In September 2019 1st phase Women + Water project was launched in two severely drought-prone districts Wardha and Yavatmal of the Vidharbha region of Maharashtra for 4 years. The project has a geographical reach of 505 villages from both the Districts that fall under 11 talukas (development blocks) Kalamb, Yavatmal, Ghatanji, Kelapur & Ralegaon are in Yavatmal District. Seloo, Devoli, Samadrapur, Hinganghat, Wardha & Arvi are from Wardha district. The project period in the 1<sup>st</sup> phase was 2019 to 2023.

2<sup>nd</sup> Phase project was commenced from February 2023 to January 2024 with an aim to improve the access, availability, quality, reliability, affordability, and governance of water for communities located in the Yavatmal and Wardha districts of Maharashtra.

So, 2023-24 is a last year of the project implementation

### **Objectives:-**

1. Community-based mapping

of water resources, piped water

systems, and water security planning and management

- 2. Demanding Budgetary Provision for drinking water schemes and implementation of drinking water supply schemes
- 3. Strengthening people's institutions to manage water sources and take up the outcomes of interventions in the future
- 4. To improve the groundwater level in the 400 villages of drought-prone areas of Yavatmal and Wardha district

Key highlights of project:

• O&M and Water tax collection training has been provided to SHG members of 24 villages

• Capacity building of 72 members of gram panchayat (GPs) around source sustainability and O&M in intervention panchayats

- Provided training to 48 women members on the process of Village Action Plan (VAP) preparation
- In 60 villages post monsoon water sources testing has been done.

The geographical location of the project is Nagpur city in the city three schools have received the benefits of restructuring of WASH and sanitation structures of the schools, as well as increasing the capacity of the students, teachers, and cleaning staff on the use and upkeep of new systems and adopting the best practices and maintaining the WASH and sanitation structures and cleanliness of school premises.

### Case Study

### 1) HRDP:-

**Background** - Observed World Environment Day at the community level through the support of VDC, PRI, health workers, and community representatives & and created awareness among the community for creating a healthier environment for the future. The theme of goodness related to welfare of the society has been created at the community level through an awareness program. Neem, guava, pipal, and jack fruit plants were planted on eve of Environment Day and the foundation stone for the plantation drive was laid. Dr. Ishu Sahu from KVK, Gariaband participated in this program.

### Intervention and Impact –

- The theme of the World Environment Day "Beat Plastic Pollution" campaign, was focused on the solution of plastic pollution, and by reusing plastic bottles and polythene, different home decorum items were prepared and displayed at the community level.
- Awareness has been created to reduce the use of plastic and recycle plastic through such innovative items.
- The Hariyali group of all the villages has been told about their responsibility towards the environment.
- Advised to protect the environment by planting saplings on roadside, forest land, and other infertile land and requested all the villagers to actively participate. Along with this, a message was given to save the environment by planting saplings.
- This program was celebrated as a foundation for future plantation campaigns and awareness was created among all the participants by expressing their responsibility for the protection of the environment.
- A letter has been coordinated with the District Collector regarding the environmental consciousness.
- Planned to transplant a minimum of 8000 agro. Forest plants through convergence with Forest Department in FY 2023-24.

### 2) Usha Salai Machine: Ms. Anita Bai

Churkatola is a village which is situated 13 Km from Sultanpur block of Raisen District, Madhya Pradesh. Village population would be approximately approx. 3600. Most of families here are dependent on farming,



Animal husbandry and laboring.

Anita Ji is 37 year old Married, Specially abled, strong will powered woman. Her Husband Mr. Lakhanlal is also specially abled person who used to work Cycle repairing and puncture work in village.

Anita Ji is mother of two boys and one girl Her all children are studying. She takes care of her husband, son and daughter. Anita Ji shared that before starting the Swavlamban Silai School, she was merely earning 1000 to 2000 through stitching job to feed her family. Anita's whole family was depending on this small income. Sometime this income got reduced when there was no work. In such a situation life became very unmanageable.

Anita Ji had interest in Sewing and stitching and used to stitch clothes for neighbors as part time job. After seeing her interest in Swing and stitching, she was provided with opportunity to attend 9 Days residential training of USHA SIDBI Swavlamban Silai School and establish her own Swavlamban Silai School.

She completed the 9 Days training where she learnt about machine's technical knowledge and Sewing and stitching. She performed very well during training and last day she received Sewing machine, Signage board, Syllabus book, service manual and certificate. She completed this training on 27 September 2021 to 5 October 2021 and started her USHA Silai School on 15 October 2021.

Since then Anita never looked back and expanding her Swavlamban Silai School. Currently She is teaching sewing and teaching 5 women and take charge of 200 Rs per student. She also takes job orders from village and nearby 4 to 5 villages. She has done very well through Swavlamban Silai School. She also trained her specially abled Husband on sewing and stitching and now her husband is also assisting Anita Ji in her work order. Swavlamban Silai School leaves very strong and deep impact on her life. She is now setting example for other women through her work. She is very enthusiastic about her school and in future. She thinks that she should contribute towards her children's education and better life. She further said that now this is her initial stage of her school. She further said that now people are also recognizing her as a Sewing Teacher and starts enquiring about the course also. She is very hopeful that next month more learners will take admission in her Swavlamban Silai School. She stated that she is very thankful to USHA and SIDBI for providing her platform and opportunity to become a Swavlamban Silai School teacher. She stated that USHA has developed her as a professional Entrepreneur because now people link her with brand and recognize her as USHA Silai Teacher.

### 3) UDAAN Youth Federation – Bhopal



In Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, a network, and alliance of organizations ( AARAMBH , UDAY, MUSKAAN & BACHPAN) implementing Safe City Program came together to address child rights issues through a comprehensive approach. Recognizing the need for a youthled initiative, the network aimed to establish a City Level Youth Federation to empower adolescents and protect children in the city.

The objective was to empower adolescents and protect children in Bhopal through a comprehensive

approach that includes awareness-raising, advocacy, capacity building, and community engagements. Additionally, it aimed to enhance the capacities of young people to take leadership roles in helping others live meaningful lives and contribute to society. It also sought to establish a cadre of dedicated, motivated, and trained youth leaders willing to engage in community-building activities. A series of consultations and meetings were conducted to discuss the objectives and structure of the federation and build capacities of the youth. A Core committee comprising representatives from the network and interested organizations was formed to oversee the establishment of the federation. Selected candidates underwent trainings on child rights, leadership skills, advocacy, and community engagement.

The federation conducted various awareness campaigns on child rights issues, including child labor, child trafficking, and child marriage, to educate the community and mobilize support for its initiatives. This included advocacy and policy level engagement through dialogue with local political leaders as well as govt officials. participating in meetings, organizing rallies, and submitting petitions.: They organized community engagement activities, such as meetings, trainings, and cultural events, campaigns to involve community members in its initiatives and raise awareness about child rights.

The establishment of a strong network of youth leaders dedicated to promoting child rights in Bhopal. Increased awareness and understanding of child rights issues among community members. Policy changes and initiatives at the local level to protect and promote child rights. Enhanced capacity of young people to take leadership roles in community development activities. UDAAN Youth Federation - Bhopal has been a significant step towards empowering adolescents and protecting children in the city.
